

Ilya Grinberg continues to work on his 1/72 RAF Mustang Mk 1 from the Academy kit. He's replaced the wing and nose machine guns and added some overlapping sheet metal panels for surface detail. He also brought in his older AML P-40 MkIIb that he's repainting and redetailing.

Eric Hillebrand has a flair for unusual military





proved again this month. He's built the tractor from the reissued Lindberg Snark kit (hope he builds the rest of the kit) just for fun, adding some photoetched screens, detailing the hood and drilling out wheels and the exhaust. He also finished up a WWII Russian Stalinetz artillery tractor from the old 1/35 Azimut resin kit. The kit tracks were unusable so he substituted some T34 tracks. It's a very interesting model, but weird looking.

Ernie Yuhnke, our iron man from the figure world, showed us a dozen or so 54mm painted figures, mostly from the French Revolution/Napoleonic era, along with a larger scale English Beefeater guard and small scale (old Airfix 1/600?) models of HMS Revenge and Santa Maria. Cool stuff.



Seth Geller comes up with some unusual collectors items. This month he had a Microscale 1/48 scale Douglas A2D Skyshark. Back in the mid to late '70's, Microscale resurrected some old 1950's molds made by a company

as

called Allyn. They started out as simple manufacturer's desk models that were eventually sold as kits, very similar to early Aurora or Hawk kits. There was also an XF-92, an F4D Skyray and I think a Convair XFY-1 in the series. Microscale added nice decals, but that's all, so the series never sold very well and disappeared. In a previous life, I really coveted these kits. Never mind.



Bob Conshafter showed us his Maquette T34 Model 1940 work-in-progress. Work is the operative word here as the kit is a conversion of their original Model 1945. There are lots of parts to accomplish the conversion and lots of stuff to fix. Bob feels that the kit is overall more accurate than the DML kits, however.

The rest of the models are mostly candidates for the "I am not a modeling loser Part DOH!" non-contest for the 2008 NOREASTCON contingent.





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


