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Notes From The September Meeting Dick Schulenberg

The important topic for the September meeting was the vote to propose to Doug Hamilton, our IPMS Region I Coordinator and the other clubs in IPMS Region 1 that IPMS Niagara Frontier will sponsor NOREASTCON 2009 at McKinley's Banquet & Conference Center, S-3950 McKinley Parkway, Blasdell, New York 14219 on the last weekend of April, 2009.

The selection of a show site is crucial to our ability to host a NOREASTCON. It's our biggest expense and out biggest exposure. Bob Collignon, who will be the Show Chairman if our proposal is accepted, presented the logic and economics for the selection of this site. On the whole, the site is as good as or better than any we have had, without the specter of room nights hanging over our final expenses. The Clarion Hotel adjacent to McKinley's offered an exceptionally good room rate that they would hold for the show. The site selection committee did a great job with finding an excellent show space. Thanks to all of you for your efforts.

After some very positive discussion, the vote to go forward was unanimous, so "onward and upward"! There are lots of details to iron out once we're approved by the Region. We'll keep you posted, and we will be asking for our help.

As a lot of you know, Tom Faith has been an active War of 1812 re-enactor out at Fort Niagara for many years. He's also involved with the museum in the fort. Recently, they decided to replace the historical diorama of the fort with a new 5 foot by 6 foot diorama. Tom is looking for volunteers to help out. He'll be glad to talk to you about how you can help, so see him at the next meeting. Sounds like this could be a neat project to be involved in.

The round the room question came from Mike Miodonski's editorial in Dizpatch. He wrote about how model kits have become increasingly complicated with parts counts in excess of 500 pieces. Granted, the high parts counts often cater to multiple versions, but do modelers really benefit from the complexity?

The question made for an enjoyable, wide ranging discussion that was very reflective of the individual's modeling philosophy, more so than their time in the hobby. Many like the "all on one box" options and the opportunity to become more involved in the building, as opposed to painting. Others thought that this kind of kit tends to be over engineered and that the fit of the components suffers. Some find that prepping the many parts before construction becomes a turn-off after awhile and the build never progresses while others find the prep work relaxing. I loved the statement from someone: "Complexity has never stopped me from starting a kit". For some, the complex kits give them a better sense of what went into the real thing, while others feel that simpler, good fitting kits are more apt to get people into the hobby. A number of modelers look forward to the challenge and complexity, really enjoying it as a journey in which modeling skills are developed, no matter how the model comes out. Some felt that some kits are complex for the sake of complexity while others feel that if the kit is not complex, they'll have fun making it complex. Great stuff. Now pick one and get out there and build!

I apologize that I have no report of the models on the tables. I had to leave before we got to the discussion. There were quite a few of them and they looked great.

Mike Miodonski carried out the photo shoot of the model cars for the Car and Driver model car photo contest. It always amazes me how many excellent car modelers we have in this club and how prolific you are. Good luck with the contest. We'll all look forward to seeing the results.

Well, lots of good stuff again this evening. The next meeting is on October 15. Remember to bring your completed projects, works in progress, new kits, or a model you'd like to show off.
