Notes From The November Meeting Dick Schulenberg

Tonight's meeting was dedicated to building and there was quite a bit of activity and rubbernecking going on.

President Mike Miodonski called for impressions about the SYRCON and Cleveland Model shows. Those of us who were fortunate enough to get to the shows all felt they were well worth the trip. SYRCON is a relatively small show that is growing each year. The site is

easy to find and very nice, with good lighting and good food on site. There were some impressive models on the tables and a nice cross section of vendors. The Cleveland Model Show has grown to the point of overcrowding their present high school site. Vendors overflow from the school gym and the excellent contest models overfill the cafeteria. The organizers have found a new and bigger site for next year at a local community college on the same road but nearer the I-90 interchange, so it will be even easier to find the show. Both shows should be on your to-do list. I'll be there for sure.

We had several tables full of models on display as well.

Dave Armitage filled a good portion of one of the tables all by himself with quite a range of recently built models and dioramas. Here's a list:

Shadowbox diorama of a Civil War Union Army 13" mortar named "Dictator" with crew Italeri (ex-ESCI) WWII German Demag halftrack in 1/35 scale

Russian ASU-57 airborne assault gun from the 1/35 scale Maquette kit

Several 1/35 scale WWII Russian figures

1/200 US Civil War ironclads USS Nashville and CSS Palmetto State from Verlinden kits A neat little 1/72 Heller Morane Saulnier MS 225 parasol wing pre-WWII French fighter A big scale brass headed Roman battering ram from a Mantua kit

A very nice 1/35 scale WWI diorama based on a boxed set of Emhar soft plastic figures

Joe Villone had a couple of diverse items too. First was a small scale 1880 cavalry revolver, the famous Colt Peacemaker. This was from a die cast kit that Joe cleaned up and finished quite nicely. Second was a conversion of the Accurate Miniatures P-51B into Bill Odom's "Beguine" racer that crashed in the 1949 Thompson Trophy race in Cleveland. This racing version of the P-51 replaces the familiar belly air scoop with wing tip radiators. Joe used an older, out of production resin conversion kit and Red Pegasus decals to make this striking green model.

Brian McFee was in with a 1/48 scale Grumman Hellcat from the Hasegawa kit. He finished this model as an F6F flown off USS Essex in late 1944 and mounted it on a flight deck base. The paint and decal work is exceptionally well done.

Tony Gliszczynski finished up another model in his marathon building effort, a very neat looking 1/25 Dodge Magnum in metallic purple. Nice one, Tony.

Paul Hines also finished up his current model, the CSS Alabama that he has been bringing in so we can see his progress. This is a wood kit of the famous Confederate steam and sail commerce raider of the American Civil War. It's very neatly done with lots of care and extra detailing lavished on in all the right places. Very nice display, Paul.

Frank Blonski showed us his current work in progress, a 1/25 scale Austin Coupe body with a scratch built frame. He's cross kitting the Austen body with parts from a 1957 Chevy Street Burner kit, supplemented with lots of chopping and fitting to make a one of a kind Pro-Mod vehicle. Cool looking car, Frank.

He repositioned some of the body parts to get the look he wanted, then "weathered" and "damaged" the model for more realism. An interesting idea he used was to keep all the "damage" on one side so that he can display his model in different aspects, depending on the sensitivities of his audience.

I brought in my almost done I/350 Imperial Russian cruiser Novik. This was my 2 month project from last summer's non-contest. Didn't make it then, but I'm closer now. I still have some detail wire work and weathering to do before the rest of the rigging is installed. One of these days.

Bob Conshafter stopped in at Borders and found several neat reference books on WWII military vehicles that he brought in for us to peruse. There's ots of solid information in these reasonably priced books. Take a look sometime soon.

To finish up the table models, Andre Theriault brought in his 1/350 USS Enterprise nuclear carrier that we picked for his show and tell project. He's getting there. The under the flight deck structure is in place as are the ship's boats and guns. He repainted the hull, so now he's ready to install the flight deck. Sure makes a big model.

You may remember that Tom Faith told us about a project he's involved in to build a large diorama of Ft. Niagara and the surrounding area. The museum curator was in with maps and some sample models to get things rolling. Several of us were able help work out a scale for the diorama and help with the initial planning. This will be an interesting project.

Well, lots of good stuff again this evening. The next meeting is our annual holiday celebration on December 17th. We'll have pizza and wings as well as whatever goodies you bring in. Don't forget your Toys for Tots unwrapped gifts (for 13 to 16 year olds, please). As always, bring in a completed projects, works in progress, new kits, or a model you'd like to show off.
